What Parents Need to Know About College Course Requirements

These days, getting into college is mostly based on the courses your child takes in high school (9th -12th grade). Course requirements are the classes your child must take in high school to go to an Oklahoma state college or university. These classes will not only prepare your child for college but also give your child a valuable knowledge base for entering the job market after high school.

### New Requirements for Students Entering College in Fall 2010

4 UNITS (grammar, composition and literature)

**3 UNITS** (Algebra I, Algebra II, geometry, math analysis, trigonometry, calculus and Advanced Placement statistics)

LAB SCIENCE

**3 UNITS** (biology, chemistry, physics or any lab science certified by school district -- general science courses don't qualify)

# HISTORY CITIZENSHIP SKILLS 1 UNIT of American history and 2 UNITS from the subjects of history, economics, geography, government, civics and/or non-Western culture

**OTHER** 

**2 UNITS** (computer science or foreign language units or from any of the course units listed above)

#### **Suggestion for Success**

Colleges and universities also recommend, but do not require, that students take an additional unit in math, plus two units in speech or fine arts (music, art, drama).

Many colleges and universities award college credit to students who successfully complete these courses in high school and pass the corresponding AP exams. Contact your child's counselor to see if his or her school offers AP courses.

## **Grades to Make**

What Parents Need to Know About College Admission Standards

Colleges and universities want students who have demonstrated in high school that they are capable of handling college work. When your child sends in his or her admission application, college officials will primarily look at three things:

- Your child's score on a national test (such as the ACT or SAT).
- His or her high school grade point average (GPA).
- Where your child's GPA ranks within his or her high school class or his or her GPA in the 15 core courses required for college entry.

Of course, admission standards vary among state and independent colleges and universities in Oklahoma.
